Furthermore, the impact of poor leadership is evident in the country's poor academic performance, high dropout rates, and low educational attainment. This perpetuates cycles of poverty and limits the country's economic development and social progress.

To address this issue, there is a need for increased investment in leadership training and professional development programs. The government and education stakeholders must prioritize the recruitment and retention of qualified and experienced school leaders, and provide incentives for them to work in disadvantaged areas. Prioritizing leadership development is crucial to improving the quality of education in Nigeria and equipping its youth with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in the 21st century.

### **9.0 Recommendations**

The researchers recommended the following:

1. Implement a national mentorship program pairing experienced school leaders with novice administrators to foster leadership development.
2. Establish a leadership academy to provide specialized training and certification for school leaders, focusing on Nigerian context and challenges.
3. Introduce a performance-based incentive system to attract and retain top talent in school leadership positions, particularly in disadvantaged areas.

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
