

Evaluating Nigerian Lecturers' Performance: A Context-Sensitive Measurement and Evaluation Framework.

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Abstract:

The framework incorporated multiple evaluation sources, including student feedback, peer review, and self-assessment, to provide a holistic view of lecturers' performance. Based on these findings, the researchers recommended that multi-source, and multi-method evaluation approaches that incorporated contextual factors and lecturers' feedback to enhance evaluation effectiveness should be adopted.

Conclusion:
