By prioritising accessibility, educators can create inclusive learning environments that promote equity and social justice. The intersection of resources organisation and accessibility is critical for sustainable education, as it enables learners to access and engage with relevant information, promoting lifelong learning and sustainable development. Furthermore, sustainable education requires a holistic approach that integrates resources organisation and accessibility with other critical components, such as curriculum design, pedagogy, and assessment. By adopting a holistic approach, educators can create learning environments that are tailored to the diverse needs of learners, promoting academic success and sustainable development.

The impact of library matrices on learning outcomes is a pressing concern for educators and policymakers. A systematic review of literature reveals that libraries play a crucial role in supporting student learning by providing access to relevant resources, fostering information literacy, and promoting academic engagement (Rodriguez, 2023).

8.0 Strategies for Integrating Library Matrices into Sustainability Education Framework

1. Embedding Sustainability in Collection Development

Challenges:

- Limited budget for sustainable materials.
